PREMIUM CHECKS

1. Premium checks will be dispersed to exhibitors on the two Pick-Up Days (Monday & Tuesday) following close of the fair or within thirty (30) days following close of the fair.

2. Unclaimed premium checks (Foods Division) will be mailed the following day (Wednesday).
3. Exhibitors awarded over \$599.00 must produce a valid, signed W-9 to be awarded premium (prize) monies.
4. Premium checks not cashed in ninety (90) days of issue date become void and will not be reissued.
5. Lost or stolen premium checks will not be reissued past sixty (60) days of original issue date.
6. No claim that a premium(s) has not been paid, or that there was a discrepancy in payment of the premium(s) won, will be considered when claim is made later than November 30 following the Fair.

RULES and REGULATIONS

The South Carolina State Fair General Rules and Regulations and the rules stated in this guide shall apply.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Exhibitor must be a resident of South Carolina or full-time student residing in South Carolina.

ENTRY REGISTRATION

1. Registration, using the fairs online entry system, is required during the Open Entry Registration Period.
2. Online entry registrations are confirmed at time of submission.
3. Please print and bring your confirmation on Delivery Day.
4. Absolutely no entries will be accepted following the close of the Open Entry Registration Period.

ENTRY TAGS

Entry tags will be provided at time of delivery of exhibit(s) to the fair.

LIMITATIONS

1. An Exhibitor may register only one (1) article per class. Entering multiple articles in the same class will result in disqualification of all articles.
2. No entry having previously won a sweepstakes at the Fair may be entered.
3. Entries will be displayed at the discretion of Fair Management.
4. Any registered entry entered erroneously, may be transferred to the proper class prior to judging only at the discretion of the Department superintendent. If such classes have been judged, they shall not be judged again.
5. Fair Management reserves the right to disqualify any entry found to be unsuitable for public exhibition.

REQUIREMENTS

1. Entries must be the sole work of the exhibitor, except as listed for Group classes, and completed within the last three (3) years.
2. All Baked Goods and Special Baking contest entries must be prepared and intended for human consumption.
3. All framed entries must have wire hangers and meet size requirements.

JUDGES DECISION FINAL

1. The judges have sole discretion in deciding which entries receive ribbons based on their assessment of the quality of craftsmanship displayed by the exhibitor.
2. This may result in the awarding of several first or second place ribbons in a class or the awarding of NO first or second place ribbons in a class.
3. Decisions of the judges are final.

UNCLAIMED ENTRIES

1. Neither the South Carolina State Fair nor the Home and Craft Department staff will be responsible for any entry not claimed by the end of the second release date.
2. Unclaimed entries become the property of the SC State Fair and will be donated to charity.

SPECIAL AWARDS

CANNING RULES & REGULATIONS

1. The Home and Craft Department General Rules and Regulations shall apply.
2. Canned entries must be canned in this calendar year.
3. No canned entries should be re-entered in the Fair.
4. Standard unlabeled canning jars are mandatory.
5. Fruit and vegetable entries must be canned in pint jars.
6. Jam, Jelly, Catsup, Relish and Sauce entries must be canned in ½ pint jars.
7. Canning jars must have jar rings and be sealed
Jam, Jelly, Preserves and Marmalade entries must be heat sealed (no paraffin).
8. Canned entries are judged on appearance only.
9. It is not customary to open canned entries.
10. Bread and Cakes in jars will not be accepted.

USDA RECOMMENDATIONS

- Headspace is the unfilled space above the food in a jar and below its lid.
- USDA recommends headspace in specific foods as follows:
 - Jams and Jellies - ¼ inch
 - Fruits, Tomatoes, Pickles, Relishes, etc. - ½ inch
 - Low Acid Foods processed in pressure canner - 1 inch to 1 ½ inches

Do your canned goods pass this test?

OVERALL APPEARANCE

- Good proportion of solid to liquid.
- Full pack with proper headspace.
- Liquid just covering solid.
- Free of air bubbles.
- Good seals?
- Free of imperfections -- stems, cores, seeds.
- Outside of container clean.

FRUITS AND VEGETABLES

- Characteristic, uniform color?
- Shape retained -- not broken or mushy?
- Proper maturity?
- Pieces uniform in size and shape?

LIQUID OR SYRUP

- Clear and free of sediment?

FABRICS & THREADS - RULES & REGULATIONS

1. The Home and Craft Department General Rules and Regulations shall apply.
2. Quality of workmanship is the first consideration in judging.
3. All stitching should be neat with no puckering.
4. Both sides of the article are judged; however, framed items will not be removed from their frames.
5. Only clean, properly pressed articles will be judged and displayed.
6. Name must be securely covered by sewn material or heavy tape.
7. Quilts must be made entirely by exhibitor, with exception of group classes, and completed within the last three years.
8. Quilts must be clean and in good condition.
9. The quilt measurements in some classes refer to the perimeter of the quilt.
10. Perimeter refers to the measurement around an object.
11. Perimeter is obtained by measuring the length of each side of an object and then adding all the lengths together.
12. Articles must be completed and pictures ready to hang.
13. Picture wire and screw eyes must be used since saw tooth hangers will not work on peg board.
14. Wall Hanging Quilts – a 4-inch sewn-on sleeve must be attached for hanging.

QUILT CLASSES - IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- Quilt entry classes reflect the class standards used by The Quilters of South Carolina and other quilting organizations.
- All quilting will be entered by technique and size.
- The quilt size refers to the perimeter of the quilt (the measurement around the quilt). Measuring the length of all sides and then adding all the lengths together determine the perimeter.
- All entries must be the sole work of the exhibitor, except in classes for groups.
- If someone other than exhibitor does the quilting for a fee, it is considered as professional quilted and should be entered under the Group quilt section of Hand-Quilted or Machine-Quilted.
- School Group Quilt classes may be found in the Youth Division.

Professional versus Amateur Defined:

- A Professional Exhibitor is defined as anyone who has earned more than \$1,000 during the calendar year either by selling their items,

teaching the subject, doing extended exhibiting, or involving themselves in other professional related activities in a capacity that would give the entrant unfair advantage over a hobbyist. Unless otherwise designated as a Professional section, all classes should be entered by Amateurs.

CRITERIA FOR JUDGING QUILTS

- Design and General Appearance: Quilt must be clean and neat.
- Visual Impact: colors, values and contrasts.
- Quilting Design: consistency, proportion and scale, unity and balance.
- Workmanship: Piecing and applique', Strong even stitching, Consistent junctions, border widths and points, Square corners.
- Quilting: Stitches even, consistent, good tension.
- No visible markings, lines and curves true.
- Binding / Edge - smooth, consistent widths, stitched securely.
