Painting Professor, Savannah College of Art and Design "It was a true privilege to serve as a juror for this year's South Carolina State Fair art competition. The breadth and quality of work submitted were exceptional, and I commend every artist who entered for their effort, creativity, and courage in sharing their work. There were many standout pieces across categories, and my fellow judges and I found ourselves engaged in thoughtful, and at times difficult, deliberations when awarding prizes. In our evaluation process, we consider several key criteria: technical proficiency, thoughtful use of materials, a clear understanding and application of the principles of design, effective color harmony, and a compelling and well-executed concept. Each piece is assessed within its category, but we also strive to consider the broader artistic voice and vision present in the work. One piece of advice I would offer to emerging artists is this: avoid the trap of being derivative. There is a distinct difference between being inspired by another artist and merely replicating their style. As judges, we are well-versed in art history and contemporary practice, and it becomes immediately apparent when a work is imitating rather than innovating. While technical skill is valued, authenticity and originality carry significant weight. We are looking to see your voice, your unique perspective and interpretation, expressed through your chosen medium.

Let your lived experience and creative vision be the foundation of your work. Thank you again to all who participated. It was an honor to witness the incredible talent present in this year's competition."
