RULES & REGULATIONS

The South Carolina State Fair General Rules and Regulations and the rules and regulations in this guide shall apply. **As an exhibitor in the SC State Fair, you agree to the following:**

- I have reviewed and agree to abide by the rules and regulations set forth in the online 2026 SC STATE FAIR EXHIBITS GUIDE.
- Upon delivery of my entry, I acknowledge that others will be using said facilities and premises at the same time and that the State Agricultural & Mechanical Society of South Carolina, aka The South Carolina State Fair, is not responsible for the acts, property, equipment and animals of others or the acts or products of any concessionaire.
- I agree that photos of exhibits taken by official fair representatives may be used on the South Carolina State Fair website and social media outlets, such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Pinterest, etc.
- I acknowledge that the State Agricultural & Mechanical Society of South Carolina, aka The South Carolina State Fair, is not responsible for any loss, injury, illness, or damage to any animals or property or exhibit articles and that such understanding and agreement is a condition of my entry or exhibit.
- Further, I agree to and hereby indemnify the State Agriculture & Mechanical Society, aka The South Carolina State Fair, from any loss, injury, damage or claim of any third person caused by any animal, exhibit, entry or property of mine or any act of anyone or mine acting on my behalf.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Exhibitor must be a living resident of South Carolina and entries must have been grown by the exhibitor in South Carolina.

ONLINE ENTRY REGISTRATION

- Online entry registration is the preferred method for registering entries. A link to the ShoWorks entry system is found on the SC State Fair website at www.scstatefair.org/competitions
- Online entry registrations are confirmed at time of submission.
- Please print/save and bring your confirmation on Delivery Day.
- An exhibitor may opt to mail an entry form and must include a self-addressed, stamped legal size envelope to receive a return confirmation that the entry form was received.

LIMITATIONS

1. Exhibitors may register one (1) entry per class.
2. Exhibitors may enter in any or all divisions, but no exhibit may be entered more than once.
3. All entries not in accordance with the schedule will be disqualified.

RESTRICTIONS – (Please also refer to additional rules for each division)

- No artificial plant material permitted.
- No hanging baskets permitted.
- No invasive plants or species permitted.
- One plant per pot permitted.
- No Spanish moss or other highly flammable substance permitted.

ENTRY TAGS

Entry tags will be provided at the time of delivery of exhibit(s) to the fair.

JUDGING

Judging is closed to the public. No person will be allowed in the show area during judging except the SC State Fair Flower staff and specified judging committee. The ultimate authority for judging is The Handbook for Flower Shows, 2017 edition with all updates from The National Gardener magazine, as published by National Garden Clubs, Inc.

CARE OF EXHIBITS DURING FAIR

- The Flower Superintendent and Show Committee reserves the right to maintain all exhibits in show condition.
- If an exhibit deteriorates to where it detracts from the entire exhibit, it will be removed from the exhibition area.
- Although reasonable care will be taken with each exhibit, fair management will not be responsible for containers or other properties.
- Exhibits may be moved by fair staff to accommodate special flower shows held throughout the run of the fair.

RELEASE OF EXHIBITS

The SC State Fair and the Show Committee will not be responsible for exhibits or ribbons left after the scheduled release date and time (see Important Dates). Unclaimed exhibits and any other items will become the property of the SC State Fair and will be either disposed of or donated to charity.

PREMIUM CHECKS

- Exhibitors awarded over \$599 must provide the Entry Office a valid, signed W-9 to receive premium (prize) monies.
- Premiums will be paid by check within thirty (30) days after the close of the Fair.
- Premium checks not cashed in ninety (90) days of issue date become void and will not be reissued.
- Lost or stolen premium checks will not be reissued past sixty (60) days of original issue date.
- No claim that a premium(s) has not been paid, or that there was a discrepancy in payment of the premium(s) won, will be considered when claim is made later than November 30 following close of the Fair.

- Rules:
- South Carolina State Fair General Rules & Regulations apply.
 - The exhibitor must be a current resident of South Carolina.
 - Exhibitors may enter only one (1) Fairy Garden.
 - Fairy Garden must be made by the exhibitor.
 - There is no size limitation, but the exhibitor must be able to carry the container into the building without any assistance.
 - *Artificial Plants are **not allowed**.* Please use live plants.
 - Fairy Garden must contain at least one (1) Fairy (fantasy figures, gnomes, etc.).
 - Materials used should be *natural*, found, recycled, or repurposed items. Material examples include strings, twine, glue, stones, pebbles, sticks, leaves, tree bark, pinecones, acorns, feathers, seaweed, dried grasses, moss, nuts, shells and much more. Plants and accessories may be obtained from any source. Fake plants and flowers are not allowed.
 - Construction Notes: Create a strong base/platform for easy transportation. Remember that steel, iron, and hematite are toxic and harmful to fairies.

Rules:

- Plant Qualification: Plant must have been inherited from another person (relative, friend, neighbor, etc.)
- Ownership Duration: Plant must have been in your care for at least one year.
- Plant Condition: Plant must be alive and pest-free
- Display card and identification: Each entry must have a display card that includes the following information: owner, original owner, plant name, estimated age, and story. Photos are allowed to be included on your card but must be secured. The fair is not responsible for lost photos or cards.
- Display card may not be larger than 8.5"x11". Please bring a stand for your card to make reading easier. Get as creative as you want with your display card.

100 – Annuals

200 – Dahlias – AA Size (Over 10")

CUT HORTICULTURE RULES & REGULATIONS

- All exhibits must be fresh.
- After an exhibit has been judged, if it begins to wilt/die, fair management will dispose of the sample. All remaining cut horticulture will be disposed of at the end of the fair and not returned to the exhibitor.
- Exhibits that are not deemed show worthy due to pests, grooming or disease will be refused.
- Horticulture specimens must be properly named. If class is not listed on the schedule, entry will not be accepted.
- All entries must be grown by the exhibitor and entered in the grower's name only.
- Specimens with a class designation in the schedule may not be entered in the "Any Other" class.
- Cut Horticulture Limitations:
 - Entries are limited to thirty-five (35) entries per exhibitor.
 - Entries are limited to one (1) entry per class, per exhibitor, in all divisions.
 - Fresh-cut specimens of annuals, biennials and perennials must have been in exhibitor's possession from seeds, cuttings or immature plants and grown for ninety (90) days. Exception: no minimum for early maturing seeds and/or transplants.
- Only foliage and/or flowers naturally grown and still attached to the specimens are permitted. Unattached foliage is never included with a cut specimen.
- Bulbous blooms must have been in the exhibitor's possession from planting of bulb, corm, rhizome, or it must have been cared for as a mature plant at least 90 days. Exception: no minimum for forced bulbs/corms/tubers/rhizomes.
- Terminal bloom must be present at apex of spray, positioned as high or higher than all other blooms and surrounded by four or more blossoms, each on its own pedicel (stem), initiating from the peduncle (main stem). A spray in which terminal bloom is depressed more than one-half its (the bloom) diameter below the highest point of inflorescence is penalized in direct proportion to the severity of the depression.
- Camellia japonicas are exhibited on one to two-inch stem with two leaves attached, in clear plastic cups, provided by the SC State Fair.
- Camellia sasanqua blooms are exhibited on branches. Leaves must be attached to the stem.

- Fresh-cut arboreal (woody ornamentals) must have been in the exhibitor's possession for at least 6 months.
- The SC State Fair will furnish clear, glass bottles/containers for all cut specimens.
- Wedging is permitted using clear plastic wrap only.
- If a plant is considered a flowering plant, it should be exhibited as a flowering specimen; however, foliage plants may flower but should be exhibited as a foliage plant if they are grown for their leaves.
- When the number of varieties of specimens in a class is stated, an exhibit of greater or lesser number will be disqualified.
- Cut horticulture specimens will not be returned to the exhibitor. To avoid risk of spreading plant viruses or diseases, all cut horticulture exhibits will be disposed of by fair management either when the specimen has wilted or at the end of the fair.

CUT HORTICULTURE CUTTING INFORMATION

Large Cut Foliage

- Only one (1) frond, leaf or stem is required, not to include trees or shrubs.
- Total length must be a minimum of 42" from tip to cut end and total length is limited to a maximum of 8' (96").
- Specimens require large containers (furnished by SC State Fair) with broad base weighted with pebbles, to prevent tipping over.
- May use green Styrofoam for wedging provided by exhibitor.

Blooming Cut Plant Material – Annuals

- Cut plant material should be displayed with 1 stem and a minimum of 2 leaves.
- Sprays should be displayed with a minimum of 3 blooming stems with 2 leaves on each stem.

Blooming Cut Plant Material – Perennials

- Cut plant material should be displayed with 1 stem and a minimum of 2 leaves.
- Sprays should be displayed with a minimum of 3 blooming stems with 2 leaves on each stem.

Climbers and Vines

- Total length must not exceed 36" from terminal bud to cut end.
- No cut portions of vines are eligible for entry.

Culinary Herbs

- Cut specimen length must not exceed 24" from cut end to apical tip.
- All specimens must be exhibited at proper state of maturity for best taste and quality, table ready for consumption.

Decorative Cut Foliage – Frond and Leaf

- Only one (1) frond or leaf required.
- Total length must not exceed 36" from cut end to apical tip.

Decorative Cut Foliage – Plume and Stem

- Only one (1) plume or stem required.
- Total length must not exceed 36" from cut end to apical tip.

Dwarf Shrubs and Miniature Roses

- Cut branch length must not exceed 18" in length from cut end to apical tip.
- Minimum length determined by overall shrub size and requirement of several nodes.
- Each entry must have several nodes and a complete tip.

Flowering, Berried, Fruited or Coned Shrubs

- Cut branch must be a minimum of 18" and not exceed 30" in length from cut end to apical tip and include several nodes and central leader. Rhododendron is the exception (Standard 12" and Encore 4").

Foliage Shrubs

- Cut branch must be a minimum of 18" and not exceed 30" in length from cut end to apical tip and include several nodes and central leader.

Trees

- Cut branch length not to exceed 30" in length from cut end to apical tip and include several nodes and the central leader.

TROPICALS RULES & REGULATIONS

- Tropical exhibits must be fresh.
- Exhibits that are not deemed show worthy due to pests, grooming or disease will be refused.
- All entries must be grown by the exhibitor and entered in grower's name only.
- Only one (1) entry allowed per class.
- Only one (1) plant allowed to a pot unless specified in the schedule.
- Exhibitor must provide a drip saucer for each plant entered.

LIMITATIONS:

- Entries are limited to twenty-five (25) entries per exhibitor.
- Entries are limited to one (1) entry per class, per exhibitor, in all divisions.
- Entries may be moved by fair staff to accommodate special flower shows throughout the run of the fair.
- Due to space and for ease of handling, potted plants must be in pots not exceeding sixteen (16) inches from outside lip to outside lip across the top. Pots over sixteen (16) inches will not be accepted.
- Container grown plants must have been in the exhibitor's possession at least ninety (90) days prior to show.
- Unless specified as a multiple planting, combination planting, or dish garden, all container-grown plants must have only one species or cultivar per container.

- Container-grown plants must have been grown in the pots in which they are exhibited. Double potting is permitted. Containers must be scrubbed clean on the outside and visible inside portion.
- A specimen's roots may be "contained" within a living moss ball (Kokedama) or on a board or stone with a covering over the specimen's roots.
- Unobtrusive soil surface coverings such as sand, pea gravel or mulch may be used in container grown specimens.

NOT PERMITTED:

- Disposable nursery pots
- Hanging baskets. A potted plant does not mean a hanging basket with wires removed.
- Leaf Shine
- Spanish moss
- Wiring of specimens
- Plants must be free of insects, disease, and spray residue. Potted plants in straw or ornamental containers are discouraged.
- Exhibitors should submit only those entries that are clean, without dead leaves, spent blooms, and are free of insects/disease.
- Plant material must be in its natural state and may not be altered by application treatment of oil, commercial "shine" products, etc. that change the natural appearance.
- Foliage plants mean grown for their foliage and not flowering plants without blooms. Foliage specimens may have flowers present, but flowers must be insignificant.
- Awards of Merit will be given only if warranted. To be eligible, the entry must be a blue-ribbon winner, scoring 95 or over and named correctly. Plants having won the Award of Merit previously are not eligible to win a second time.
- Entries will be accepted only for classes offered in the current year's Exhibit Guide.
- Container Grown Flowering Plants – Standard Size Containers
- Single-blossom specimens should be three-fourths to fully open.
- Plants with multiple bloom stems need at least one-fourth to one-half flowers open.
- Plants should not be totally in the bud stage nor have all their flowers fully open.
- Round container size must be greater than 4" diameter but less than 16" diameter.
- Rectangular container size must be greater than 13" perimeter but less than 48" perimeter.
- Container Grown Foliage Plants – Standard Size Containers
- Foliage specimens may have flowers present, but flowers must be insignificant.

GENERAL PLANT INFORMATION

FROM THE 2017 NATIONAL HANDBOOK FOR FLOWER SHOWS...

- The 2017 National Handbook for Flower Shows bans all invasive plants entry in any National Garden Club flower show, in both the horticulture and design divisions.
- The American flag and other national flags must be displayed in a respectful manner and may not be incorporated into any competitive design, nor used as underlays, backdrops, swags, etc. in any division of a flower show.
- No artificial plant material is permitted in any division. Fresh Plant Material must be emphasized.
- National Garden Clubs, Inc. prohibits the use of all living members of the animal kingdom and taxidermal representations of the same in any design or horticultural exhibit.
- To avoid risk of spreading plant viruses or diseases, all cut horticulture will be disposed of at end of each show by the dismantling committee prior to removal time. Only container plants and designs may be removed by the exhibitor.
- No South Carolina conservation plant material is permitted in any designs or horticultural exhibits. These plant materials may only be used in Flower Shows for Educational Exhibits and should never be collected from the wild. - *Ribes echinellum* (Miccosukee gooseberry)
- *Sagittaria fasciculata* (bunched arrowhead)
- *Sarracenia rubra* (Jones' pitcherplant)
- *Schwalbea americana* (chaffseed)
- *Sisyrinchium dichotomum* (blue-eyed grass)
- *Trillium persistens* (persistent wakerobin)
- *Trillium reliquum* (Confederate wakerobin).
